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THE JOURNEY OF DHAKAI JAMDANI

Textiles have shaped the society that we see at present. It showcases the journey of India, its culture, and the aesthetics of traditions. This catalog aims to provide a range of Deccai Jamdani that have their historical narratives, an influential present, and a significant tomorrow. The term 'jamdani' is of Persian origin; it appears in literature as early as the third century BC (in Kautilya's 'Arthashastra') and as long as the Gupta dynasty (4th - 6th century AD). Megasthenes, a Greek geographer, described Bengali muslins in the 4th century BC. Inspired by the fabric's diaphanous quality, Romans called it the "woven air." Another mention of Jamdani may be found in the 9th-century book Sril Silat-ut-Tawarikh, written by Solaiman, an Arab geographer, where he discusses the exquisite fabrics created in the state of Rumy (modern-day Bangladesh). There are even recordings of Alexander the Great contemplating the geometric patterns of printed cotton.Merchants and travelers from Arab, China, and Italy were also aware of Jamdani. All of them mentioned it in the book of Periplus of the Eritrean Sea (circa first CE) about the delicacy of Jamdani fabric.

word jamdani is derived from jaamdaar, a Persian weaving term for floral designs in the cotton thread or

possibly, jama, the Bengali word for the dress. It was also believed that after ornamental flower designs were discovered on Dhakai textile, it became known as a Dhakai Jamdani. Jamdani is a handloom woven fabric made of cotton, which historically was referred to as muslin. Muslin was handwoven from uncommonly delicate handspun yarn in a village (Sonargaon, Rupgani, Narayangani, Bajitpur, and Jangalbari) near Dhaka. It was produced from a cotton plant that grew exclusively along the banks of the Brahmaputra River. The finished cloth was sought by royalty and traded globally across countries of the Middle East, Europe, Asia while earning enormous revenue for those involved in its trade.

The beginning of jamdani production took more than twelve centuries to start spinning the weave. Jamdani Production reached a pinnacle during the latter period of the Mughal empire. The patronage of the Mughal rulers lifted the skill of muslin weaving to an art par excellence. Abul Fazal, in Aini-Akbari, divulges that Emperor Akbar was a great benefactor of this industry. The Mughal administration engaged agents who governed the best weavers and monopolized their products so According to popular belief, The that muslin, which was already a rich man's luxury, now became a complete royal monopoly, a privilege that only the royalty could afford. Its ultimate

test of fineness was to pass a sari width through a small golden ring. Centuries before the arrival of the Mughals, the Bengali textile industry had exported fine cotton muslins to both Roman and Chinese empires. It was during this period where the weavers started producing this cloth but only for the royal family. At the time of the Mogul empire, Madhurapur and Jangalbadi were famous for this textile fabrication. But after a few decades, villages and regions like Madhupur and Jagalbadi were lost in dust due to the oppression and tyranny of Regal. The textile woven for the crowned heads was dubbed Mulmal Khas, and the governing agents labeled it with poetic names such as Aab-i-rawan, Sharbati, and Shabnam. The Empress Nur Jahan, too, was a patron of these diaphanous and feather-light textiles, and even the austere Aurangzeb was incredibly fond of muslin. Emperor Shahjahan and later Emperor Aurangzeb received a tribute from the weavers of Dhaka year after year, and their gifts, in all their diaphanous beauty, were paraded through the streets of Dhaka in cases of gilded bamboo before being presented to the Emperor. It is said that annually about Rs 100,000 worth of Mulmul Khas was presented to the Mughal royalty.

A famous incident is mentioned in the 17th-century Mughal account, which is the earliest known reference to jamdani. One day, the Mughal emperor Aurangzeb was astonished to see his beautiful eldest and favorite daughter, Princess Zeb-Un-Nissa, strolling naked in the garden. Outraged by her immodesty, the emperor demanded to know why she was walking outside without clothes. The princess calmly replied that she was wearing her "jamas". She claimed she was wearing

seven garments sewn from a jamdani so transparent and refined that they seemed invisible to her father's eyes.

Foreign travelers have described the unparalleled fineness, beauty, and universal popularity of Dhaka Muslins. They have particularly mentioned the name of muslin fabrics manufactured in Dhaka and Sonargaon. Sebastien Manrique (Portuguese Augustinian missionary and traveler), a visitor to Dhaka in 1640, mentioned the hectic business activities in Dhaka by merchants from many nationalities, with a special reference to merchants from Khorasan (Persia).

The Bengal Nawab himself sent malbus to the emperor as tribute. Malbas, Locally called Jamdani, was flowered and decorated in the loom. Besides malbas, other textiles such as patterned jamdanis, silk products flowered in silver, plain clothes, seer bands (for headgear) were sent to Delhi. These products were procured from the range of Dhaka, Sonargaon, Bajitpur, and Jangalbari.

In the 17th and 18th centuries, the fabric became a much desired and expensive trade goods exported west to Kabul, Balochistan, Persia, Arabia, and Greece. Jamdani continued to be produced and exported during the days of the British Raj, but the British supported their agriculture and textile industries at India's expense. At the beginning of the 19th century, the quality of Bengali jamdani got a different level of recognition when James Taylor described the beauty of the textile within a few words. Taylor, the Scottish minister, and historical author depicted Jamdani as a floral or figured textile. Later, at the end of the 19th century, Trailokyanath Mukhopadhyay,

also known as T. N. Mukharji, insisted on naming this cloth 'Jamdani muslin'. After a few decades, jamdani started facing various obstacles in the British era. British rulers started exporting cheaper yarn from European countries, which cost a massive loss for Jamdani producers. The local cotton yarn began to lose its market, which was one of the primary reasons for the turning down of Jamdani.

The main peculiarity of jamdani's work is the geometric design. Jamdanis have different names according to their design. For instance, panna hajar, dublijal, butidar, tersa, jalar, duria, charkona, mayurpyanch, kalmilata, puilata, kachupata, katihar, kalka pad, angurlata, sandesh pad, prajapatipad, durba pad shaplaful, baghnali, juibuti, shal pad, chandra pad, chandrahar, hansa, jhumka, kauarthyanga pad chalta pad, inchi pad, bilaiadakulnaksha, kachupata pad, badghat pad, karlapad, gila pad, kalasful, muralijal, kachi pad, mihin pad, kankrapad, shamukbuti, prajapatibuti, belpata pad, jabaful and badurpakhi pad. Duria jamdani has designs of spots all over. Belwari jamdani with colorful golden borders used to be made during the Mughal period, especially for the women of the inner court.

Jamdani fabric with intricate patterns for weddings and formal wear generally takes a minimum of nine months to weave. These textiles are colorfully patterned on the sheer cotton fabric, and it combines the intricacy of design with muted or vibrant colors. The material is often grey cotton, ornamented with *zari* (gold and silver wire). Usually, weavers do not draw the design beforehand on paper, and they work on the design from their memory and express their creative

geniuses. Each pattern is woven with mathematical precision, and this art has been passed down from generation to generation, as seen in this catalog. Most of the weavers are Muslims who believe figurative representations in art directly challenge the Supreme power. For this reason, artisans create motifs drawn from nature or abstract designs with a geometric sensibility.

Pit looms are still used; however, the original throw shuttle has been replaced by the fly shuttle, a faster and more efficient method of production that still depends upon the hand for guidance. Traditionally, the plain weave background was white, off-white, or grey; today, background colors are chosen from a vibrant array. The best quality jamdani is produced with locally grown, fine cotton. It is always woven during the monsoon season from June to October when the air is humid, and moisture prevents the fine threads from becoming brittle and breaking. Bundles of thread are dyed in a variety of colors. The dyed thread is strengthened and softened by soaking overnight in a solution of rice water starch, allowing the women to wind it more easily onto bobbins. It is tedious work done early in the morning, usually between four and nine, before the increasing heat dries the thread, making it more difficult to handle. The wound bobbins are sent to another worker who prepares the warp on a beam. Afterward, the warp is sent to the weaver's house, set up on a loom. Drawings are placed under the warp as a guide. The weaver, almost always a man, may or may not follow the drawing, often preferring to work from intuition alone. Colored thread is carefully inserted and hand-tied into the fine weft to create patterns on the plain weave.

From the beginning, this artistic cloth got a tremendous response, not only in Bengal but also in the world. However, this fabric was a part of importing markets during the Mughal period; after a few decades, jamdani faced various obstacles in the British era. British rulers started exporting cheaper yarn from European countries, which cost a considerable loss for Jamdani producers. The local cotton yarn began to lose its market, which was one of the primary reasons for the turning down of Jamdani. During the period of British colonialism, extraordinary designs including figures and floral motifs were included in Jamdani. This period was mentioned as 'dhakai muslin's golden age" in history.

In 1947, after the partition, many weavers moved to West Bengal from the root of Jamdani, Dhaka. This incident helped develop a new jamdani market in India and a new beginning of jamdani weaving in present-day India. Over the last few decades, the art of jamdani weaving has witnessed a revival due to support from the governments and non-government organizations in India and Bangladesh.

In this catalog, we are also showcasing Jamdani from the time of the British. It is believed that due to import and export monopolies in Bengal, forcing any merchant attempting to import cotton or silk from another state had to pay >30% duty. At the same time, they were also compelled to sell export bound cotton and silk to the East India Company; failing to do so resulted in fines, imprisonments, floggings, or forced indenture in an EIC factory. On occasion, local weavers were reported having cut their thumbs to avoid producing Jamdani textiles, which

further resulted in the collapse of the handwoven art of Dhakai jamdani. As an example, fortunately, we have one piece of jamdani manufactured under the East India factory named Glassow company.

Today's weavers are campaigning for the revival of many of the traditional and more intricate motifs. These designs required many long months to be spent at the loom to produce worthy of rank and royalty. The muslin may no longer be fine enough to pass through a wedding ring, but the efforts of the weavers have retained the art of weaving, making this fabric worthy of being called the queen of textiles. The legendary Dhakai Muslin, produced from a select variety of cotton, has been extinct for over 100 years.

Through this catalog, we are showcasing the Rarest and most exemplary pieces of Jamdani from the collection of Siddhartha Tagore belonging to Dhaka (Bangladesh) and one piece of Jamdani, which was manufactured under the East India factory naming Glassow company. The significance of jamdani is enormous in terms of its heritage value and the memories and the unheard Tales of Jamdani that can be experienced in our display.

The Pallu of the saree is covered with a symmetrical design pattern and floral pattern with the earthy red color which symbolizing love, passion, desire, sexuality, sensitivity, romance, and joy for the married couple.




